Accidental Shakespeare

Accidental Shakespeare tells a new history of the Shakespearean text via experiments with book design, editorial failure, and counterfactual editorial histories. It investigates how the New Bibliographic orthodoxy of

distinguishing “substantive” features of early printed plays (words) from “accidental” features (punctuation, spelling, and anything else affecting the “formal presentation” of the text) has obscured stories about editorial audacity that shaped “Shakespeare” in ways we have yet to acknowledge (e.g., Edward Capell’s unreadable editorial experiments in the eighteenth century; A.H. Bullen’s pricey dream vision for the “Stratford Town Shakespeare” at the turn of the twentieth century; and Alice Walker’s inheritance in the mid-twentieth century of the old-spelling Oxford Shakespeare that never materialized).
